

RECREATIONAL CAMPFIRE

A 3' X 3' recreational campfire using clean, dry, untreated wood is the only type of burning permitted in St. Clair. Burning leaves and grass is not allowed. The following is an excerpt from the City of St. Clair Burning Ordinance:

RECREATIONAL CAMPFIRE REGULATIONS & SAFEGUARDS	
SIZE:	3' X 3' in diameter with a flame height not more than 4'
LOCATION:	at least 15' from any structure or property line
WOOD:	clean, dry, untreated wood in lengths of 3' or less
WEATHER:	consider wind and weather conditions prior to lighting a campfire
SMOKE:	minimal detectable smoke, odor or soot should be noticed beyond the property line
SUPERVISION:	campfires should be attended by a person 18 years of age or older
EXTINGUISH:	extinguish the campfire completely before leaving the site
<p>While burning a recreational campfire, every effort should be taken to avoid creating a nuisance or a health or safety hazard.</p> <p>Recreational campfires are prohibited when the Blue Earth County Sheriff's Dept. or other authority has issued a burning ban.</p>	



GRASS CLIPPINGS

When mowing your lawn, please mow so that your grass clippings blow into your yard and don't end up on the street. City Ordinance prohibits the practice of mowing grass clippings or raking leaves into the street, curb or gutter. During a rainstorm, grass clippings and other yard debris can quickly plug storm drains and cause back-ups and other problems.



PET OWNERS

Pet owners, please be respectful of your neighbors and follow the City Pet Ordinance:

- Keep your dog or cat on a leash or under your control at all times. Provide adequate leashing, fencing or other means to insure that your pet stays in your yard and doesn't run loose.
- Don't allow your dog to habitually bark and howl.
- Don't allow your dog to wander onto neighboring property to pee and poop!
- When walking your dog, pick-up after him, don't leave the mess behind.
- Obtain a dog or cat license at City Hall.
- Dogs and cats found running at large will be picked-up and impounded in Mankato. Retrieving an animal from the impound is very costly!



Call 9-1-1 ... to report a dog bite or a potentially dangerous dog (a dog who's behavior poses a threat or danger to public safety) ... including biting, nipping, growling, chasing and similar aggressive behavior.
